Rich's full time job is Director of Family Life for the Diocese of Lansing. We are still finalizing who will be working with students up to 8<sup>th</sup> grade who are interested in learning more about and/or becoming Catholic at the Easter Vigil in the spring. #### Jonathan Edwards' "Resolutions"

Last week, I mentioned Jonathan Edwards (1703-1758), and his "resolutions" that he wrote out of a commitment to help him live his life well. At the 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. Masses, I shared a few of those resolutions. Coming as they did from a 19 year old young man, it is no surprise that he had such a productive and holy life. Indeed, they are striking for their wisdom and faith. May we all be intentional as we live our lives, so that we will have few(er!) regrets when we come to the point of our own judgment.

The Resolutions of Jonathan Edwards (1722-1723) Being sensible that I am unable to do anything without God's help, I do humbly entreat him by his grace to enable me to keep these Resolutions, so far as they are agreeable to his will, for Christ's sake.

Remember to read over these Resolutions once a week.

- 10. Resolved, when I feel pain, to think of the pains of martyrdom, and of hell.
- 14. Resolved, never to do anything out of revenge.
- 17. Resolved, that I will live so as I shall wish I had done when I come to die.
- 50. Resolved, I will act so as I think I shall judge would have been best, and most prudent, when I come into the future world. July 5, 1723.
- 51. Resolved, that I will act so, in every respect, as I think I shall wish I had done, if I should at last be damned. July 8, 1723.
- 52. I frequently hear persons in old age say how they would live, if they were to live their lives over again: Resolved, that I will live just so as I can think I shall wish I had done, supposing I live to old age. July 8, 1723.

These comments make it clear that Jonathan Edwards "began with the end in mind," as they say. And that end, of course, is *the ultimate end*—death and judgment. His hope (and aim) was living with God in heaven forever. May we, like him, be intentional in the ways we live our lives, to live in distinctively Christian ways. That is, that we would live so as to become *saints*. When we live that way, we will be salt, light, and leaven in our world, and others will see the difference in our lives. Living as Christ desires us to live will help us be of greater earthly good than living only for this world. May we "follow Jesus" and one day live with Him in heaven. Lord, have mercy! Come, Holy Spirit!
