Padre Pio Talk

When: Thursday, September 17 at 6:15pm Where: St. Therese Parish in the Church , beginning with a recitation of the Divine Mercy Chaplet, the presentation will begin at 7pm

St. Therese Parish will be hosting a special event on St. Padre Pio on the evening of Thursday, September 17. St. Padre Pio was an Italian Franciscan friar who lived from 1887 – 1968. During his lifetime, he experienced on his body a perpetual stigmata, the five wounds of Christ. He had the ability to prophesize and to read souls. Through his prayers, miraculous cures took place and continue to take place until this day. Dr. Pat Castle of Papillion, Nebraska, will be coming to St. Therese to give a talk entitled "Meeting" St. Pio: Pray, Hope and Don't Worry." He will speak about the life and ministry of St. Padre Pio. Dr. Castle is the founder of the world's largest Pro-Life Team, LIFE Runners. He has a Ph.D in nano-analytical chemistry and served extensively in the United States Air Force. He has been endorsed by several US Bishops, including Cardinal Dolan of New York City and Archbishop George Lucas of Omaha, Nebraska. Christians in the World

Last week in my homily, I quoted from a wonderful "Letter to Diognetus," which was written around 130 A.D. The letter makes plain the powerful role Christians had then, and should have now, to be salt, light, and leaven in our world. It's our call today. Let's become conspicuous for our Christianity, and help others know the love of God by the love we share and the holiness of our lives!

Christians are indistinguishable from other men either by nationality, language or customs. They do not inhabit separate cities of their own, or speak a strange dialect, or follow some outlandish way of life. Their teaching is not based upon reveries inspired by the curiosity of men. Unlike some other people, they champion no purely human doctrine. With regard to dress, food and manner of life in general, they follow the customs of whatever city they happen to be living in, whether it is Greek or foreign. And yet there is something extraordinary about their lives. They live in their own countries as though they were only passing through. They play their full role as citizens, but labor under all the disabilities of aliens. Any country can be their homeland, but for them their homeland, wherever it may be, is a foreign country. Like others, they marry and have children, but they do not expose them. They share their meals. but not their wives.

They live in the flesh, but they are not governed by the desires of the flesh. They pass their days upon earth, but they are citizens of heaven. Obedient to the laws, they yet live on a level that transcends the law. Christians love all men, but all men persecute them. Condemned because they are not understood, they are put to death, but raised to life again. They live in poverty, but enrich many; they are totally destitute, but possess an abundance of everything. They suffer dishonor, but that is their glory. They are defamed, but vindicated. A blessing is their answer to abuse, deference their response to insult. For the good they do they receive the punishment of malefactors, but even then they, rejoice, as though receiving the gift of life. They are attacked by the Jews as aliens, they are persecuted by the Greeks, yet no one can explain the reason for this hatred.

To speak in general terms, we may say that the Christian is to the world what the soul is to the body. As the soul is present in every part of the body, while remaining distinct from it, so Christians are found in all the cities of the world, but cannot be identified with the world. As the visible body contains the invisible soul, so Christians are seen living in the world, but their religious life remains unseen. The body hates the soul and wars against it, not because of any injury the soul has done it, but because of the restriction the soul places on its pleasures. Similarly, the world hates the Christians, not because they have done it any wrong, but because they are opposed to its enjoyments.

Christians love those who hate them just as the soul loves the body and all its members despite the body's hatred. It is by the soul, enclosed within the body, that the body is held together, and similarly, it is by the Christians, detained in the world as in a prison, that the world is held together. The soul, though immortal, has a mortal dwelling place; and Christians also live for a time amidst perishable things, while awaiting the freedom from change and decay that will be theirs in heaven. <u>As the soul benefits from the</u> <u>deprivation of food and drink, so Christians flourish under</u> <u>persecution. Such is the Christian's lofty and divinely</u> <u>appointed function, from which he is not permitted to excuse</u> <u>himself.</u>

He has helped out with the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) classes for the last few years, and I'm grateful that he will be serving the parish in this way. Details about the RCIA class times will be finalized soon. We are still finalizing who will be working with students up to 8th grade who are interested in learning more about and/or becoming Catholic at the Easter Vigil in the spring.
