New Mass Times

Beginning last weekend, we now have Sunday mornings we will have three Sunday Masses, at 8:00 a.m., 9:30, and 11:30. The faithful at the Masses was almost evenly divided, so thank you. We had coffee & donuts after all three Sunday Masses in Mercy Hall. We ran out at the 11:30, but we will order more donuts next week. Thank you to all those who are helping us be able to offer donuts after all three Sunday Masses.

All Saints' Day & All Souls' Day

Next Sunday, November 1, is All Saints' Day, and we will celebrate it at the 5:00 p.m. and the three Sunday Masses. On Monday, November 2nd, we will celebrate All Souls' Day. I will celebrate the 8:15 a.m. Mass, the school Mass, and, consistent with the tradition that we established last year, the evening Mass at 6:30 p.m. will be a Memorial Mass for all the parishioners who have died within the last year. (November 2 is not a Holy Day of Obligation.) I will wear white vestments next Sunday for All Saints Day, which we will celebrate in place of the 31st Sunday of the Liturgical Year. As is my custom for funerals, I will wear black vestments on Monday, November 2nd. I wear black because we are praying for those who are in the process of purification after death.

Purgatory a Place of Promise and Grace

If we're honest, we can admit that most of us are not yet perfect (which Jesus tells us is a pre-requisite to see God), and are likely not going to be perfect by the time—however near or distant that is—when the Lord calls us home. For us, the imperfect, Purgatory is a great grace. Though it is often confused as a place of "second chance" for those who did not know God or live in grace in their earthly life, it is instead a condition in which believers are purified of any imperfections and stubborn "attachments" to things less than God. Through the purifying fire of God's love, aided by our prayers and acts of reparation, those in purgatory are perfected and will, in God's perfect timing, enter the joy of heaven. Here is how the *Catechism of the Catholic Church explains it*:

III. THE FINAL PURIFICATION, OR PURGATORY 1030 All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. 1031 The Church gives the name <u>Purgatory</u> to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire: 605

As for certain lesser faults, we must believe that, before the Final Judgment, there is a purifying fire. He who is truth says that whoever utters blasphemy against the Holy Spirit will be pardoned neither in this age nor in the age to come. From this sentence we understand that certain offenses can be forgiven in this age, but certain others in the age to come. 606

Purgatory is not a place but a condition of existence.
5. In following the Gospel exhortation to be perfect like the heavenly Father (cf. Mt 5:48) during our earthly life, we are called to grow in love, to be sound and flawless before God the Father "at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints" (1 Thes 3: 12f.). Moreover, we are invited to "cleanse ourselves from every defilement of body and spirit" (2 Cor 7: 1; cf. 1 Jn 3: 3), because the encounter with God requires absolute purity.

Every trace of attachment to evil must be eliminated, every imperfection of the soul corrected. Purification must be complete, and indeed this is precisely what is meant by the Church's teaching on <u>purgatory</u>. The term does not indicate a place, but a condition of existence. Those who, after death, exist in a state of purification, are already in the love of Christ who removes from them the remnants of imperfection

It is necessary to explain that the state of purification is not a prolongation of the earthly condition, almost as if after death one were given another possibility to change one's destiny. The Church's teaching in this regard is unequivocal and was reaffirmed by the Second Vatican Council which teaches: "Since we know neither the day nor the hour, we should follow the advice of the Lord and watch constantly so that, when the single course of our earthly life is completed (cf. Heb 9: 27), we may merit to enter with him into the marriage feast and be numbered among the blessed, and not, like the wicked and slothful servants, be ordered to depart into the eternal fire, into the outer darkness where "men will weep and gnash their teeth' (Mt 22: 13 and 25: 30)" (Lumen gentium, n. 48).

6. One last important aspect which the Church's tradition has always pointed out should be re-proposed today: the dimension of "communio". Those, in fact, who find themselves in the state of purification are united both with the blessed who already enjoy the fullness of eternal life, and with us on this earth on our way towards the Father's house (cf. CCC, n. 1032). (St. John Paul the Great, General Audience of Wednesday, 4 August 1999)

C.S. Lewis on Purgatory

Our souls demand purgatory, don't they? Would it not break the heart if God said to us, 'It is true, my son, that your breath smells and your rags drip with mud and slime, but we are charitable here and no one will upbraid you with these things, nor draw away from you. Enter into the joy'? Should we not reply, 'With submission, sir, and if there is no objection, I'd rather be cleaned first.' 'It may hurt, you know.' 'Even so, sir.' (from Letters to Malcolm, Chiefly on Prayer)
