As you may know, I had been exposed to someone who had COVID-19, and so was unable to attend the retreat I had scheduled for the first full week of January. I got tested on Monday January 4th, which came back negative. I never developed symptoms, but decided to take advantage of the priests who were scheduled to cover Masses for me, to take time to pray and get renewed not in the warmth of Florida sun, but the beauty of the Michigan north. Thanks to all those of you who have been praying for me. It has been a time of rest, renewal, and prayer. And, of course, in light of the events of the past few weeks, a time to reflect on how best to lead the parish and school moving forward. Please do keep me and all religious (and civil) leaders in prayer, as we seek the best way forward. The Lord has poured out His Spirit upon us Christians, to be sources of healing, light, and love. May we be Who We Are in Christ more faithfully and effectively this year.

Lord, Heal Our Land

What a time we are challenged, privileged, and graced to live in! The horrific events of January 6, the mutual recriminations that have followed those events, ongoing safety concerns about the inauguration, as well as Big Tech's overreach should all be of concern to every American. Yet, despite the uncertainty of our times, our first response must, as always, be to pray. We must pray for our leaders, both civil and religious, and for ourselves. We need wisdom to discern how best to serve as salt, light, and leaven in our world. We are bearers of the light, and our call from the Lord is to serve as lights in these dark times. The temptations to demonize the other, whomever the "other" may be, are strong, and we must resist them. We are called by our Lord to see as God sees, to love as God loves, to hear and respond as God would respond. Come, Holy Spirit! We need to look to the Lord, to pray for ourselves, our nation, and (especially) our enemies, even as we seek to offer a way forward, informed by the scriptures and the social teaching of the Church.

Lord, Heal Our Land II: MLK

This Monday, as our nation takes a day to honor Martin Luther King, Jr., let us pray for continued healing of the wounds of racism in our nation, state, and community. The Lord invites us to love one another, and the historical and cultural divides are ones the evil one longs to exploit. May we be men and women who speak and act for the promotion of equity and justice in our Land. Clearly, this past year has proven to expose dark impulses of prejudice, scapegoating, and demonization, and we are called, as Christians, to provide to a power-obsessed world, a different way forward. For us, guided by prayerful reflection, we need to see as God sees, to hear as God hears, and to love as God loves. That will, if we let it, lead us all(!) to acknowledge our own sins and to extend to one another (to everyone) mercy and grace. We must show that we are all brothers and sisters in Christ, and are not, and never have been, rivals for power or privilege or prestige. We, after the pattern of our Lord, should strive to be the

servant of all, focusing on those who are suffering the most. Let us pray that we will be agents of mercy, grace, healing, and forgiveness. The world needs the Christian path to follow. May we be witnesses to a world that is fixated on power.

"Ordinary Time"

Today, we celebrate the 2^{nd} Sunday in Ordinary Time. There is nothing "ordinary" or "plain" about "ordinary time." The name stems from the word *ordinal*, meaning "numbered." The Latin for this liturgical period, which makes up the majority of our Liturgical Year, is *Tempus* Per Annum, which means "time throughout the year." We do have special seasons during the year, but every Sunday of Ordinary Time is a day of obligation. We have an extraordinary opportunity to experience God's redemptive love for us when we gather together as a community of faith at Mass. Each and every time we celebrate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, we recall Christ's Incarnation, His Death, His Resurrection, His Ascension, and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us for the forgiveness of sins. So, because the time we spend at Mass is anything but ordinary (after all, the Sacrifice of Christ on Calvary is made present, and Heaven comes to earth!), it is essential that we come each week (or even more often) to celebrate the Mass, to remember how extraordinary our life is in Christ.


Men's Retreat: Inspire! And Light A Fire
