Good Shepherds

This Sunday seems like another "Good Shepherd" Sunday, which we celebrate each fourth Sunday of Easter. This Sunday, however, we are reminded that God sees the ways that shepherds can misuse their authority. In our first reading this week, Jeremiah (23:1-6) conveys to the people of Israel (and to us) the sobering words of judgment of bad shepherds as well as His promise to address the need: *Woe to the shepherds who mislead and scatter the flock* of my pasture, says the LORD. Therefore, thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, against the shepherds who shepherd my people: You have scattered my sheep and driven them away. You have not cared for them, but I will take care to punish your evil deeds. I myself will gather the remnant of my flock from all the lands to which I have driven them and bring them back to their meadow; there they shall increase and multiply. I will appoint shepherds for them who will shepherd them so that they need no longer fear and tremble; and none shall be missing, says the LORD.

Behold, the days are coming, says the LORD, when I will raise up a righteous shoot to David; as king he shall reign and govern wisely, he shall do what is just and right in the land. In his days Judah shall be saved, Israel shall dwell in security. This is the name they give him: "The LORD our justice."

Shepherds Good and Bad

The Lord sees what is happening in our Church today. He sees the confusion that is evident in places, and he laments the failure of some shepherds to hold to what is Good, True, and Beautiful. Jesus, the High Priest and Good Shepherd weeps with those who suffer under flawed, weak, sinful, and selfish shepherds. (Of course, all priests and bishops are flawed and sinful, but, thanks be to God, not all are guilty of the failures that Jeremiah decries today.) For reasons we cannot fully grasp, the Lord allows shepherds (including me) to be flawed and weak and He even allows some shepherd to harm and abuse His sheep. It is another instance of trusting His providential care for us.

Reasons for Hope

The reason we can have hope is that the Lord commits to shepherd His flock, and will show Himself the Good Shepherd. Unfortunately, this rarely happens on our timeline. So, whatever happens, we need to keep in mind what Jeremiah wrote in today's first reading whenever we (or those we love) have a shepherd who is misleading and/ or scattering the sheep: "Behold, the days are coming" Jesus, the Good Shepherd has come, and He is shepherding in and through His chosen ones, priests and bishops, to shepherd His flock. And He comes after seasons of bad shepherds, as well. We need to remember that whatever the Flock of God is enduring, anywhere on earth, the Lord Himself is enduring, and He sees. And we know that He will follow through on His commitment to "appoint shepherds . . . who will shepherd them so that they no longer fear and tremble . . ." Come, Lord Jesus! Come! May those who mislead and scatter the flock convert back to the Lord, and repent of their failures, so that all the faithful

have shepherds who love and serve and lead as Jesus would have them do. (Including, of course, me!)

Please Pray for Priests!

Whenever I read texts that speak of the Lord's great promise to give His Flock shepherds after His own heart, I am encouraged and sobered. I'm grateful for the example of Jesus who has called me and other priests to serve and shepherd His flock. As I have said repeatedly, I count being pastor of the Church of the Resurrection among the truly great gifts to me from the Lord, but I know that I need to continue to grow in my emulation of the ministry of the Good Shepherd. Please pray for me and my brother priests, that we would have hearts ever more conformed to that of the Good Shepherd, Jesus the High Priest.

Fostering Vocations

The Lord has chosen to shepherd His flock through men He has called to serve as priests, as shepherds after His own heart. The Lord is calling each of us to the universal calls to holiness and love. The more time we spend in prayer, in contemplation, and reading of the Scriptures, the more we will know the experience of the Eternal Life we have in Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit. And, the more we know the power of the Holy Spirit, the more open we will be to hear the Good Shepherd's call in our lives.

A Culture of Vocations

I hope and pray that the Church of the Resurrection will become an increasingly supportive context and culture in which vocations to the priesthood and religious life can be fostered and nurtured. I am grateful that three young men from our parish are in the college seminary. I hope and pray that other young men will prayerfully consider the possibility that the Lord is calling them to join me and my brother priests in living out this great vocation. (I would love to talk with any of you men who are wondering if the Lord is calling you to consider becoming a priest, by the way.) As we all know, priests are called to follow the example of Jesus, who is the Good Shepherd. St. John Vianney, the patron for priests, stated the reality very well when he wrote the following: "The priest continues the work of redemption on earth If we really understood the priest on earth, we would die not of fright but of love The Priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus" (Quoted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1589). Once again, please pray that Bishop Boyea, my brother priests, and I will be shepherds after the heart of Jesus, the Good Shepherd.
