PARISH REGISTRATION



Lent is confession time! I think more people go to confession during Lent than any other time of the year, thanks be to God! A few days ago, in response to the little bit I wrote last week about going to confession, a parishioner commented, "I feel so much lighter, the burdens lifted, after I go." And this is after a number of years of having the reluctance to go to confession and now finds it helpful and beneficial. I was so happy to hear those comments Here are ten benefits of confession.

- 1. Confidentiality guaranteed. There's nothing like confessing your sins to someone guaranteed not to tell anyone else. Sometimes you need to talk in absolute confidence. Even under subpoena, a priest can't tell anyone what's said to him in confession. He can't even hint at it. Now that's confidentiality.
- 2. Housekeeping for the soul. It feels good to be able to start a clean life all over again. Like going into a sparkling living room in your home, it's nice when clutter is removed even if it's your own.
- 3. A balm for the desire for revenge. When you have been forgiven you can forgive others. If the perfect Jesus forgives me, who am I to want to avenge the slights in my life. Think: "Why did they promote him over me?' or "Mom played favorites!"

 4. Low cost therapy. It's free, which makes it cheaper than a psychiatrist for dealing with guilt.
- 5. Forced time to think. Socrates said that the unexamined life is not worth living. To examine our lives and acknowledge failings marks the first step of making things right with God, others and ourselves. Life can be more worth living when you ponder the meaning of your own life.
- 6. Contribution toward world peace. *Gaudium et Spes*, the Second Vatican Council's Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, said that the imbalances in the world that lead to war and tensions "are linked with that more basic imbalance which is rooted in the heart of man." Peace of soul leads to peace of heart leads to peace beyond oneself.
 7. A better neighborhood. Confession leaves you feeling good about yourself, thereby cutting back the inclination to road rage and aggressive shopping cart driving.



With the grace of the sacrament you're energized to, as Jesus said to the woman caught in adultery, "go and sin no more." 8. Realistic self-perception. Confession helps overcome arrogance when you have to admit you're as much of a sinner as anyone else. It helps build tolerance for others' perceived shortcomings.

- 9. One more benefit of being Catholic. There are lots of benefits, including a sense of community, liturgical rites to help us encounter God in prayer, and the wonderful sense of humanity exemplified in the saints, from Mary, the loving Mother of God, to Augustine, the exasperating son of Monica. The sacrament that leads us to inner peace is among the greatest boons. 10. Closeness to God. Confession helps you realize that you have a close connection to God and receive his grace through the sacraments. What can be better than knowing God's on your team, or, to be less arrogant about it, that you are on God's. (originally in USCCBlog, July 11, 2011) ** That being said, I and Fr. Brian Meldrum

I offer my words of gratitude to you for making me feel so welcome at your parish. It is true that I only get to see a fraction of you because of my responsibilities at St. Aloysius, but the kindness and generosity of the entire parish is evident most especially through your support of the ministries that I oversee through St. Aloysius Neighborhood Services and St. Dominic Outreach Center. The school supplies, cleaning products, canned food, and donations to both organizations at Christmas is a true testament of your dedication to the works of mercy.

The Lenten season provides us with another opportunity for almsgiving. This year, your Christian Service Commission has graciously chosen St. Aloysius Parish as one of the ministries to support. Gianna House: Gianna House is a Pregnancy and Parenting Residence and Center whose mission is to provide a safe residence for pregnant teens and their newborn infants and while providing spiritual, educational, and parenting support and resources to underserved women in our program. Teens may come to reside with us anytime during their pregnancy and remain up to 1 year after giving birth, if they so desire, during which time they continue their high school education and gain parenting and life skills.

Our Community Outreach Program serves mothers of any age by offering parenting, personal growth, spiritual journey, life skills, and enrichment classes. By attending classes, mothers earn "Baby Bucks" to obtain needed items from our baby shop, as well as gain social support from one another. Here is how one mother explains why she participates in our program. "My name is Monique and I have a beautiful, happy, daughter, Serenity, who is 15 months old. I have been attending Gianna House since the beginning of my pregnancy. The reason I continue to come to Gianna House after having my child is because they are a support group and family. The classes they offer here are the classes I need to be a better me and to be as good a mom that I can be. I also meet some other mothers here I can relate to or whom I can share my story with — someone who is now going through what I went through during my pregnancy and after my pregnancy. Before I came to Gianna House, I didn't have anyone to vent to, and the ones I did vent to judged me. But here we don't judge each other no matter what. We try to build one another up. I can honestly say I am happy that Gianna House came into my life when it did, and I'm happy that I met the wonderful moms who come here as well. 

Do you ever identify with Peter in Scripture? He's impulsive, he loves Jesus but doesn't always get it right. In today's Gospel, instead of just being in the awesome moment of the Transfiguration, he wants to go back down the mountain to get what is needed to build three dwellings.

I think a lot of us can be like that. We want to do something to preserve the special moments instead of just being in and enjoying them.

I love seeing and having photos of happy, significant events and times but I also know that sometimes trying to capture all in photos keeps me from really enjoying those moments. When Pope Francis visited the U.S. I remember reading about a man who was positioned right up front on the route that Pope Francis would be traveling on. As Pope Francis approached, the man was adjusting and getting his camera ready for the perfect shot. And he got it. What he said afterward was revealing. He said that while doing all that for the photo, he missed the incredible moment when Pope Francis was just inches away from him.

We have been writing about things to "do" during Lent and those are important ways to grow closer to God. But it's important to remember

that just "being" with Jesus in prayer enables us to grow beyond our expectations.

It's not easy is it? Spending distraction-free time in prayer takes work to really pray mindfully, to use a current phrase.

Peter's impulse to do something is not all bad. We have been called to live an active faith. We have been called to share our faith by performing acts of mercy, building up our communities, building and maintaining our churches, supporting ourselves and our families by working, and on and on. In other words, using our gifts to build up the Kingdom of God on earth.

But we need to also take time to just be with God. To just try and listen and not be distracted from that communion with Him.

We are a both/and religion, so along with the spiritual offerings, the retreats and missions that we do this Lent, let's try and take time out of our busyness to just be with Jesus in quiet, so when He speaks we can just listen.
