Archdiocesan law requires advance notice of at least six months.

Newcomers to the parish may register in the Parish Office during regular office hours. Others, please notify the Parish Office of address changes. Adults over 21 need to be registered as an individual member to be considered a Catholic in Good Standing.

Hearing devices are available for use during Mass. Please ask an usher for assistance.

Looking at the calendar, remember the big vicariate penance services are next Monday, the Monday of Holy Week and the Thursday before Palm Sunday. These services are communal with individual confession. ** We continue to pray for those inflicted with the coronavirus and for the well being of all people. Thank you for your understanding to refrain as much as possible from shaking hands. During the Sign of Peace at Mass, you may shake the hands of your family but offer a verbal sign of peace to others. Likewise, refraining from holding hands during the Our Father is advised. We will continue these practices, as well as not offering the Blood of Christ at Holy Communion, until we get the all clear to resume the practices. Remember, keep washing your hands with soap and water many times throughout the day! ** Thanks to all who are patrons of our Fish Fry and all the volunteers who make it happen. We have been having very good crowds and getting the thumbs up on the new menu item, the Southwest Rice Bowl! If you have not come to one, check us out from 5 - 7 pm in The Pointe.

Gianna House: Gianna House is a Pregnancy and Parenting Residence and Center whose mission is to provide a safe residence for pregnant teens and their newborn infants and while providing spiritual, educational, and parenting support and resources to underserved women in our program. Teens may come to reside with us anytime during their pregnancy and remain up to 1 year after giving birth, if they so desire, during which time they continue their high school education and gain parenting and life skills.

Our Community Outreach Program serves mothers of any age by offering parenting, personal growth, spiritual journey, life skills, and enrichment classes. By attending classes, mothers earn "Baby Bucks" to obtain needed items from our baby shop, as well as gain social support from one another. Here is how one mother explains why she participates in our program. "My name is Monique and I have a beautiful, happy, daughter, Serenity, who is 15 months old. I have been attending Gianna House since the beginning of my pregnancy. The reason I continue to come to Gianna House after having my child is because they are a support group and family. The classes they offer here are the classes I need to be a better me and to be as good a mom that I can be. I also meet some other mothers here I can relate to or whom I can share my story with — someone who is now going through what I went through during my pregnancy and after my pregnancy. Before I came to Gianna House, I didn't have anyone to vent to, and the ones I did vent to judged me. But here we don't judge each other no matter what. We try to build one another up. I can honestly say I am happy that Gianna House came into my life when it did, and I'm happy that I met the wonderful moms who come here as well. Family Connection

Lent is a season for repentance. It is a season during which we are called to reflect upon and to live deeply the promises of Baptism. The well and the conversation about water immediately recall for us the Sacrament of Baptism. As the Samaritan woman was converted and sent on a mission because of the

conversation about water, we too are converted and sent by our Baptism to preach the good news of Jesus to others.

Take this opportunity to reflect upon the importance of Baptism with your family. If you have photos or other mementos of your family's Baptisms, bring them out and take some time to recall the day of Baptism and its importance to you and your family. Create a prayer table that includes these mementos and a bowl of holy water. After you have spent some time talking about Baptism, invite everyone to listen carefully and prayerfully to today's Gospel. Read John 4:5-42 together. Ask how Jesus' meeting with the woman at the well is like Baptism. (Jesus knows the woman's sin and forgives her. The woman comes to know Jesus as the Messiah. The woman invites others to meet Jesus.) Pray a prayer of blessing for each member of the family that God will help each one live the promises of his or her Baptism. Close by praying together the Lord's Prayer.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK Homemade Irish Soda Bread

4 cups flour

½ cup sugar

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

8 tablespoons butter, softened

1½ cups raisins

2 eggs

1½ cups buttermilk

2 teaspoons caraway seeds

(optional)

Sift dry ingredients into a medium size bowl. Work in butter with fingers. Add raisins (and caraway seeds if desired). In a separate bowl, combine eggs and buttermilk. Make a well in center of flour mixture. Add eggs and buttermilk. Mix together with a wooden spoon until dough becomes stiff.

Turn out onto a floured board. With floured hands, knead lightly and swiftly for a few seconds. Place smooth side up in a lightly floured 8-inch round cake pan. With a floured knife, cut a deep cross on top.

Bake at 350 F for 1 hour until golden brown.

Cool on a wire rack.

go and make disciples

Have you been to confession lately? Lent offers many more opportunities to avail ourselves of the sacrament. Decades ago, "penitents" anxiously waited in long lines to confess their sins. What has changed?

We do now basically what we did then. But the primary focus of the rite has changed. As in all acts of worship, the focus of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is on God and what God does. The focus of confession was often on me and my sinfulness. Even in naming the sacrament we have moved from "confession" (what we do) to "reconciliation" (what God does).

It has been called the sacrament of Penance, the sacrament of reconciliation and confession. Confession because telling our sins to a priest is an essential element of the sacrament; Penance, because it consecrates our repentance from sin; and Reconciliation because it restores our relationship with God.

Maybe fewer Catholics "go to confession" because they miss the real point of the sacrament.

What is the real point? Confessing our sins is important, but it's not the *most* important thing. Contrition is important but it isn't the *most* important thing. Examining our consciences is important but it isn't the *most* important thing.

What is the most important thing? *It's what Jesus does!* That's the most important thing, the thing we should focus on. The examination of conscience, sorrow for sin, telling the sins to the priest—these are all important. But what Jesus does is the reason to experience this sacrament often.

If we think about the sacrament as the Sacrament of Reconciliation and not as "confession" we will have a more positive, enriching experience. Confession is only one part of the sacrament.

In the Sacrament of Reconciliation Jesus announces to us, through the priest, that our sins are forgiven and that we are loved by God. We hear the voice of Christ: "Go in peace, your sins are forgiven." This is what Jesus does. This is His gift of reconciliation.

Peace is the gift of the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Why "go to confession"? The gifts of peace and love are there waiting for us to ask for them.



2020 Census: Accurate Counts = Fair Representation

The 2020 Census begins in March. It will determine Michigan's representation in Congress for the next decade—and Michigan is at risk of losing at least one of its fourteen seats. The count also influences how state legislative districts are formed. To ensure the voices of Michiganders are accurately reflected in government decisions, it is critical that the state's population count is as precise as possible. Census number affect everyone, from seniors to students, kids and parents, and businesses and communities.

Here are important dates to know:

- March 2020 April 2020: Households are invited to participate in the census by mail, phone or online.
- April 2020: Census officials will begin visiting colleges, senior centers, transitory housing and those who
 are experiencing homelessness to aid in the counting process.
- May July 2020: The Census bureau visits homes that have not yet responded
- August 2020: The response portion of the 2020 census is completed
- December 2020: The Census Bureau delivers counts to the White House and Congress
