#### About today's hymns



Our opening hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" (*Ritual Song*, no. 735) is a metrical version of Psalm 90:1-5. It was written by Isaac Watts, and eighteenth century English minister, theologian, and logician. He was a prolific hymn writer, and is credited with some 750 hymns, many of which are based on the Psalms. One of

his most well-known hymns is the Christmas hymn, "Joy to the World." He is regarded as the Father of modern hymnody in the English speaking world. Prior to Watts hymnody was either medieval office hymns or strict paraphrases of the Psalms. What Watts did, which was very revolutionary, was to recast the Psalms of the Old Testament in the language and the message of the New Testament along with writing original hymns of the Christian experience using the language of the vernacular. Most of his hymns were written in his early twenties before he began his ministerial career after his father challenged him to improve the standard of praise. Watts was brought up in the home of a committed religious nonconformist; his father had been incarcerated twice for his views. Watts had a classical education as a youth, learning Latin, Greek, and Hebrew, and displayed a propensity for rhyme from an early age. He was once asked why he had his eyes open during prayers, to which he responded, "A little mouse for want of stairs / ran up a rope to say its prayers." The tune is named *St. Anne,* and takes it name from St. Anne's Church, Soho, London, where its composer was the organist.

The preparation hymn, "The Summons" (Ritual Song, no. 811) comes out of the Iona Community, an ecumenical religious community headquartered in Glasgow, Scotland and on the Iona, a small island in the Inner Hebrides, off the Ross of Mull on the western coast of Scotland. Iona is known for its relative tranquility and natural environment and is regarded as the birthplace of Celtic Christianity in Scotland. In the year 563 St. Columba founded and established its Abbey and monastic community, and it became the center of Gaelic monasticism for three centuries, though with the dissolution of the monasteries t fell into ruin. In 1938 the present day community was founded to by George MacLeod, a minister of the Church of Scotland, to bridge the gap which existed between the church and working people, rebuilding the Abbey as the center of a religious community dedicated to addressing social needs and as a place for spiritual retreats. This hymn was written by two leaders of the community, John Bell and Graham Maule, in 1987, and comes out of the life of the Community, who had a practice of sending youth volunteers to live for a year or two in impoverished parts of Scotland, supported only by welfare payments and working out their discipleship in hard places. At the end of their agreed periods of ministry there would be a farewell ceremony for which the authors would often create an appropriate song. This was such a song, originally intended for one-time use around 1986-87. The tune is a Scottish folk melody; its name, *Kelvingrove*, is the name of the first purpose-built public park in Scotland, located outside of Glasgow, and takes its name from the river Kelvin, which meanders through the park. Our communion hymn, "In This Place" (Spirit Song, no. 122), is by Trevor Thomson, who has worked as the associate director of worship for the Diocese of Phoenix and has also served parishes in Arizona and California. Our closing hymn, "Wherever He Leads" (Ritual Song, no. 810) was written by Baylus Benjamin McKinney, an early twentieth century American singer, song writer, teacher, and music editor. He wrote this hymn in 1936 soon after meeting his friend, R. S. Jones, who had just returned from Brazil where he was a missionary. During the meeting, Jones shared with McKinney that he had a health issue which would prevent him from returning to his beloved Brazil. McKinney is reported to have asked his friend, "What will you do?". With tears coming down his cheeks Jones responded," Wherever He leads I will go". Jones' response so deeply affected B B Mckinney that he sat down immediately that day and wrote this hymn.

Star Choir begins its fall season this Wednesday evening with its first rehearsal from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. in the church. The Choir is comprised of persons who enjoy singing and fellowship and are dedicated to offering their talents in the diligent preparation of music in a positive and engaging environment for the 11:30 Sunday mass. All that is required is a pleasant singing voice, some basic musical skills, a love of the church and joy for being in community. Choral singing is a team sport, with all working together towards common goals. Singing binds people together, has great health benefits, both physical and mental, and truly keeps one young at heart and spirit. If you wish to simply come and experience first-hand the choir, no strings attached, you are welcome to do so! Simply let Glenn know in advance so that he can have a folder and hymnal ready for you. As the motto of the Royal School of Church Music states and reminds us of the words of St. Paul, "I will sing with the Spirit and with the understanding also," so may we as a community lift up to the Lord our songs of praise. "O come, let us sing unto the Lord!"





#### **Stewardship Thoughts**

In his Gospel today, the evangelist St. Luke authors Jesus' statement on true discipleship: *Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple*. We are asked to renounce our former life and possessions to make Jesus first in our lives. In his *Unleash the Gospel* pastoral letter, Archbishop Allen Vigneron states, *Growing as his disciple demands a daily surrender to the one who loved us and gave his life for us: "I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me" (Gal 2:20)* (see: *Unleash the Gospel*, Marker 9.2, *Grow*). Discipleship requires sacrifice and may include persecution and suffering to witness Christ and His Truth. Are we willing to pay the cost? As an example, do we uphold the Church's teaching on sacramental marriage between one man and one woman at the risk of ridicule and persecution from the secular world? 
